The research shows that the people in what is now the Middle East and North-East Africa had known of an used support bandaging for a variety of funeral, religious and medical purpose from prehistoric times. This continued used of compression over a period of several millennia can be explained by its effectiveness, which assumed divine proportions with the myth of Osiris and Isis in the ancient Egypt. The interpretation of the Egyptian images, myths and rites explains the importance of bandaging for the ancients from both a profane and a sacred perspective.
